AFFORDABLE HOUSING PEE WEE HOMES ARE HERE!

The new tiny-home duplex on the corner of Craig and Sykes Street will soon welcome its first two residents! This 650 square foot duplex developed in partnership with Pee Wee Homes, Self-Help, the Jackson Center, and Habitat for Humanity will provide quality, sustainable housing for individuals transitioning out of homelessness for just \$250-\$350/month. These units are intended to provide supportive community and to fit into the shared vision for preserving Northside's future as a vital, family-friendly, multi-generational community. A site committee, made up of nearby Northside neighbors, will provide ongoing connections for the residents to the broader community. We hope you will join us in welcoming our newest neighbors at 601 Craig Street in early February!

Background

When the Northside landbank began, a Northside neighbor connected the Jackson Center to the heirs of 601 Craig Street. The Jackson Center and Self-Help met with the heirs over the course of several months, learning the history of the property and the historic owners' desire to see their family legacy continued. They held onto the property for years to keep it out of the hands of investors. When they learned about the landbank, they were excited to discuss the possibilities of having this property rebuilt within its historic character (it was one of the neighborhood's "shotgun" houses) and for folks who otherwise would not be able to afford to live in Chapel Hill. They decided to sell this particular home to help ensure the realization of this vision.

Because of the size of the lot and the existing structure, any replacement could not be larger than 650 square feet. The Town of Chapel Hill has a special provision allowing duplexes in Northside if they are explicitly for affordable housing. At the same time, Pee Wee Homes had designed models for tiny homes that were ~ 300 square feet. In partnership with Self-Help and the Jackson Center, Pee Wee Homes was able to adapt their concept for this tiny duplex that could fit within the existing footprint. Self-Help and the Jackson Center brought this option to the Northside Compass Group, who decided to move forward with the partnership and further design of the duplex.

At our monthly meeting with partner affordable housing partners, we shared this concept. Habitat for Humanity, one of the primary partners of the NNI, generously offered to help construct the duplex because they already had a high volume of interested volunteers in Northside and their existing build schedule was open. Habitat, in partnership with Dustin Rawlings (Self Help), led the construction process from there! This has allowed significant cost savings and increased community participation in the project.

NEW HABITAT HOMES IN NORTHSIDE

UNC-CHAPEL HILL AND THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL LAUNCH PARTY REGISTRATION PROGRAM

Effort will strengthen community relations and empower students

(Chapel Hill, N.C. – Jan. 10, 2018) – The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the Town of Chapel Hill today announced a new joint initiative, "Party, Police Free". Modeled after programs at the University of Massachusetts Amherst, Colorado State University and the University of Colorado Boulder, "Party, Police Free" is designed to strengthen neighborhood relations, to help students party responsibly and to empower them to be accountable to their community.

"This initiative has the potential to be a win-win for everyone," said Aaron Bachenheimer, UNC-Chapel Hill's Executive Director of Off-Campus Student Life and Community Partnerships. "Students who register and party responsibly can have a great time, while giving neighbors and police greater peace of mind and a more efficient response option should things get out of control."

Students can register their Friday or Saturday night parties online and then complete the registration in person at the Office of Community Involvement, Granville Towers South, Suite 2100. If the Chapel Hill Police Department receives a noise complaint about a registered gathering, the host will then receive one courtesy phone call or text message, giving them 20 minutes to quiet or disband the event. Police will only visit the party if a second complaint is received after the 20-minute grace period, helping the police to avoid unnecessary visits and to provide students the opportunity to avoid a fine.

"Our goal is always to keep everyone safe," said Chapel Hill Police Chief and Executive Director for Community Safety Chris Blue. "This program provides us with another opportunity to partner with the University to improve the quality of life in our community. An added benefit is that this program will allow us to use our police patrol resources more effectively."

Students who register their parties will also receive "party smart" tips on how to party safely and responsibly. These tips include: letting their neighbors know about the party beforehand, knowing who is on the guest list, designating party monitors and making sure guests have a safe way to get home.
