HEALTHY HABITS, HEALTHY FAMILIES WITH WIC

Now offering electronic benefits and FREE multivitamins!

More families than ever are finding it hard to put healthy food on their tables. For young children, a lack of good nutrition can put them at risk for health problems and challenges in school. North Carolina's Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program helps low-income families meet the nutritional needs of pregnant and post-partum women, infants and children up to age 5.

While adding more fruits and vegetables to families' diets is an important part of the program, participants get more than food from WIC. WIC offers families nutrition education and counseling, breastfeeding promotion, supplies, and support, supplemental foods, and even healthcare and other community referrals. The nutrition education and healthy foods that WIC provides really give children a healthy start in life, which is so important.

A new system in which WIC participants will be issued electronic benefit transfer (EBT) cards instead of paper vouchers, is now available! The cards function similarly to credit, debit, and food stamp cards. Rather than dealing with multiple paper vouchers at the supermarket checkout line, participants can instead use their eWIC cards, and no longer need to separate their WIC food purchase from other non-WIC items.WIC participants are able to easily check their eWIC balance, purchase history, access the shopping guide, and more by using the Bnft phone app or by visiting www.mybnft.com.

The Piedmont Health WIC Program is committed to ensuring women of childbearing age are receiving the recommended intake of folic acid daily to help prevent neural tube defects, therefore, WIC is now offering FREE multivitamins for all women receiving WIC services for themselves or their family.
