Growing up, I attended predominantly white institutions my whole life. Throughout the years, I experienced my fair share of encounters with racism and prejudice, but it wasn't until I was in high school that I felt I was truly able to understand and identify my experiences. I began educating myself on race and systemic oppression and developed a passion for social justice. This directly influenced my interest in the Jackson



Property Valuations Advocacy Residents are Starting to Receive Revaluations

After organizing to file property valuation appeals in April, longterm residents are starting to receive their revaluations. We are still waiting for all the revaluations to come in, but so far we have seen approximately \$5.5 million total in reductions of property valuations throughout the Northside neighborhood. If you are still unhappy with the outcome of the revaluation you receive, you are able to file a formal appeal.
